TO LAN-CHOW

Pereira had now to make a big detour before he could enter Tibet. The direct route would have been through Batang to Chamdo. But this for some reason, of which there is no record, was not available. Pereira employed twelve oxen yak, two ponies for himself and servant and two for his escort. These animals only cost half a rupee a day, and he gave the men the same amount as "wine money".
