comprises nearly a hundred and sixty species, and of the cultivated fig there is a vast number of varieties.

According to the Yamato-honzō¹ of 1709, figs (ičijiku) were first introduced into Nagasaki in the period Kwan-ei 克水 (1624-44) from the islands in the South-Western Ocean. This agrees with E. KAEM-PFER's² statement that figs were brought into Japan and planted by Portuguese.
