This fragment from the southern hemicycle of the cella shows a youthful head turned three-quarters to the right, rising from the hollow of the festoon. The square head with broad, low forehead, rather flat skull and strong jaws, presents a somewhat Roman character. The eyes are large and straight-set with well-arched brows. The nose, depressed at the bridge, is slightly hooked towards the end like those of the M. III 'angels', plate 1; but the line, being rubbed off at the point,
