Wheat, gaolyan, barley, mustard, peas, millet, tchumiza, maize, tobacco, hemp, and rice are grown. Average crop: in the E 8—9, in the W 7—8, in the S 10 and in the N 7—8 fold. — Tax 33,000 tan of grain and 52,000 taels. Exports: brandy to E and NW, tobacco to Kan Su, pipe tobacco to Hsi-An, paper to Kienyang, Lungchow, Tsinchow, sticks of incense to Northern Kan Su, furniture and wooden cases to Tsinchow, medicinal herbs.

After saying goodbye to Wang, who was to go direct to Hing-an-fu with my baggage in the arbah, we started this morning at dawn. The sky was leaden and gave little hope of the rain ceasing. To the E of the town the road still consisted of large stone slabs. A li or two from the town we crossed a pretty, o'd stone bridge, leading over a stream or small river that flowed between quays built carefully of smooth stone slabs. On both sides
