Ábi Gámin, see Íbi Gámin.
Ábu, a mountain in Rajvára, Lat. 24°, Long. 72° Hind. Abbreviated from the Sanskrit Árbuda, serpent, in particular a demonic serpent subdued by
Índra.
Abugarh, in Rajvara, Lat. 24°, Long. 72°
"Abu Fort." It has its name from Mount Abu. Abu, abbreviated from Arbuda, is also met with in many other geographical names, as in Abu-nagar, in Malva, Lat. 22°, Long. 80°; in Abu-pur, in Hindostán, Lat. 28°, Long. 77°. The Arabic ábu, which means father, is frequently used as a part of personal names; but in the names quoted here the resemblance of the form is accidental.
Adampúra, in Sindh, Lat. 27°, Long. 68°
Ádil Shah, in the Pănjáb, Lat. 32°, Long. 71° هادل شاه Arab. Pers. "King Ádil." Ádil, just, is frequently used as a man's name.
Afzalgårh, in the Dékhan, Lat. 17°, Long. 76° افضل گڑھ Arab. Hind. "Áfzal's house (or fort)." Áfzal, most excellent, a personal name.
Anal. Afzal-púr, in the Dékhan, Lat. 17°, Long. 76°; in Hindostán Lat. 29°, Long. 78°.
