

Malikpúr, in Hindostán, Lat. 28°, Long. 78° ملک پور Arab. Hind.
“King’s town.”

Mána, *see* Dúngnyi.

Mandalgárh, in Rajvára, Lat. 25°, Long. 75° منڈل گڑھ Hind.
“Circular fort.”

Mándla, in Málva, Lat. 22°, Long. 80° مندلا Arab.

“Aloë (jungle).” Mándal in Arabic signifies *the wood of aloes*, and the name refers to the great abundance of this plant in the environs of this town.

Mangalkót, in Bengál, Lat. 23°, Long. 87° منگل کوت Hind.
“Castle of happiness.”

Anal. Mangál-pur, in Oríssa, Lat. 20°, Long. 85°, &c.; Mangal-úr, in Malabár, Lat. 12°, Long. 74°; Mangal-dái, in lower Assám, Lat. 26°, Long. 91°; in the Pánjab, Lat. 33°, Long. 74°.

Mangyú, in Gnári Khórsum, Lat. 31°, Long. 79° منگی یو Tib. sman-gyi-yul.

“A place (containing) medicines (medicinal plants).” Sman, *medicine*; gyi is the sign of the genitive; yul, *land*, the l being here suppressed in the pronunciation.

Adolphe’s companions, though they knew the signification of the name, knew nothing about particular medicinal plants being found here.

Manikdúrg, in Berár, Lat. 19°, Long. 79° مانک دارگ Hind.

“Manik’s fort.” Manik, *jewel*, frequent in personal names, as the synonymous word híra.

Anal. Manik-gárh, in the Khandésh, Lat. 20°, Long. 74°; Manik-púr, in Hindostán, Lat. 25°, Long. 81°; in Hindostán, Lat. 28°, Long. 79°.

Manipúr, in Bengál, Lat. 24°, Long. 94° منی پور Hind.

“The gem-town.”

Anal. Lál-pur, Manik-púr, Rattan-púr, &c., *q. v.*

Mankapúr, in Hindostán, Lat. 27°, Long. 82° منکا پور Hind.

“Rosary-town.”

Mánmo Púndun, *see* Púndun.

Manohár Thána, in Bändelkhánd, Lat. 24°, Long. 77° منوہر تھانا Hind.

“Manohár’s place, or abode.” Manohár, *gaining the heart*, a personal name.
