

- Udaipúr, in Oríssa, Lat. 22°, Long. 83° . . . . . उदयपुर ادی پور Sanskr., Hind.  
 “*Town of happiness.*” The same name in Rajvára, Lat. 24°, Long. 73°; in the Pánjáb, Lat. 29°, Long. 73°; in Bengál, Lat. 25°, Long. 84°.
- Ujáin, or Ujén, in Málva, Lat. 22°, Long. 76° . . . . . उज्जयिनी اجین Sanskr., Hind.  
 “*The victorious.*” From the Sanskrit Ujjáyinī. In ancient times it was named Avánti, the protecting, and was one of the seven holy towns of the Hindús, the residence of Vikramāditya. The first meridian of the Hindu astronomers passed over Ujáin.
- Uluváni, in the Dékhan, Lat. 19°, Long. 76° . . . . . उलूवनी Hind.  
 “*Having a thicket of Ulu.*” Úlu is the native name for *Saccharum cylindricum*.

- Vánga-désa, the province Bengál . . . . . बङ्गदेश Hind.  
 “*The cotton-country*” (=Bengál). This was its Sanskrit name.
- Varakádu, a district in Maissúr . . . . . Sanskr. Kanar.  
 “*The granter of wishes.*” A surname of Víshnu, to whom a place of worship is here dedicated. Buchanan’s Journey through Maissúr, Vol. II., p. 151.
- Vazirabád, in the Pánjáb, Lat. 32°, Long. 74° . . . . . وزیر آباد Arab. Pers.  
 “*Vazír’s (minister’s) town.*”  
 Anal. Vazír-gānj, in Hindostán, Lat. 26°, Long. 80°, Lat. 26°, Long. 82, Lat. 28°, Long. 79°; Vazír-pur, in the Pánjáb, Lat. 30°, Long. 73°; Vazir-gārh, in Hindostán, Lat. 30°, Long. 78°.
- Vijaigārh, in the Kónkan, Lat. 17°, Long. 73° . . . . . विजयगड جي گڑھ Sanskr., Hind.  
 “*Fort of victory.*”  
 Anal. Vijai-nágaram, Lat. 17°, Long. 83°.
- Víndhya, a mountain range in Málva . . . . . विन्ध्य Sanskr.  
 Lassen, Ind. Alt., Vol. I., p. 81, connects it with vyadh, properly *cleavable*: here in the sense of *perforated, torn up*. He disagrees with the explanation given by Wilson (Sanskrit Dict.), who refers it to the legend of the Víndhya range opposing the sun’s returning to the south. The name Víndhya is not very generally known to the natives.
- Viramángalam, in Málabar, Lat. 10°, Long. 76° . . . . . वीरमङ्गलम् वیرمنگلم Sanskr., Hind.  
 “*Hero’s happiness.*”
