





The Jako mountain is close to Simla, and very easy of access. The principal objects of this panorama are the peaks along the boundary between Kálu and Spiti. A varied view presents itself, including numerous outer ranges of the Himálaya, as well as many snowy crests. Drawn and surveyed by Hermann, 1856, May (Or. No. 368).

### 6. PROFILE OF THE NUNEVÁRA-PANORAMA (A).

The view from the Nunevára mountain extends nearly to the western termination of the Himalaya. The mountain systems bordering the valley of Kashmír are the principal objects. The southern part of the view, which we present here, embraces 145°. The northern half, which will be given separately, is equally interesting for Tibet. The direction is here exceptionally south-south-west. Drawn and surveyed by Adolphe, 1856, October (Or. No. 374).
